# Becoming accomplished is lifetime process for Justin Seaman

Justin Seaman believes attaining true achievement is an ongoing process.

“To me, someone who’s accomplished has been consciously living their life as if it were a process of discovery and self-improvement,” said Justin Seaman, 36. “They have achieved some of their goals along the way, but material rewards are incidental.
